FAQs**

**What do I need to apply to the program?**

- You must have an associate or bachelor's degree or be part of one of our affiliate programs at Bloomsburg University, Notre Dame of Maryland University, Immaculata University, Millersville University, or York College of Pennsylvania
- You must have all the pre-requisites finished with a focused GPA of 3.0 or higher in those classes
  - You must be finished before the program starts, but you can apply even if you have one or two classes to finish in the spring between application and the beginning of the program in June
- You must apply by mailing or e-mailing the school the following documents:
  - Must be physically sent:
    - Application Fee of \$40, check or money order only
  - Preferably e-mailed but can be physically sent:
    - Application
    - 2 References, one employer and one science or math college professor
    - Transcripts from all colleges where you have completed classes

**Is the program accredited?**

- Yes, we are accredited through the Joint Review Committee on Educational Programs in Nuclear Medicine Technology (JRCNMT). You can find more information on their practices as well as find our listing at [www.jrcnmt.org](http://www.jrcnmt.org).

**When does the program begin and end?**

- The program starts in the beginning of June and ends mid-December the following year for an 18 month program

**What can I expect to be doing during the program?**

- Full time training, 40 hours a week, Monday through Fridays, 7a-3:30p
- 3-4 days of clinic and 1-2 days of in-person didactic class each week
- Classes are held at 111 Market Place, Baltimore MD, just one subway stop from the Johns Hopkins Hospital
- Clinical rotations will be at multiple hospitals both in and out of the Hopkins network
- Training in general nuclear medicine, positron emission tomography (PET), and computed tomography (CT)

**What are your program outcomes?**

- We are proud to have a 100% job placement rate for students seeking employment in nuclear medicine and CT, going back many years
- We have very competitive board examination pass rates, which can be viewed on our website
- Our students are able to sit for the nuclear medicine and CT boards, allowing them many options for their career and giving them a competitive edge over other

#### **What expenses can I expect during the program?**

- Tuition and fees
  - We do not accept federal financial aid as we are a certificate program
  - We do have an agreement with Sallie Mae for students to get loans for the program
    - You must apply for these loans independently through Sallie Mae
- Housing in the area
- Maintaining a car for reliable transportation
  - Not every site has public transportation access
  - All sites will be within an hour drive of the schools
- Health insurance that covers you in Maryland
- Textbooks for classes
- Uniforms (scrubs, black non-porous shoes, etc)

#### **Are there any opportunities for tuition reimbursement if employed at Johns Hopkins following graduation?**

- **Yes!** While a position must be available, and graduates must complete the traditional application process resulting in an offer, **graduates of the Johns Hopkins Schools of Medical Imaging that accept positions within The Johns Hopkins Hospital or a Johns Hopkins Imaging Site are eligible for up to \$10,000 in tuition reimbursement after two years of employment.**
- This is in addition to any sign-on bonus offered at the time.

#### **Where do students typically live?**

- The faculty connects incoming students as early as April should students look to house together
